Name of Waterway	Problem	Suggested Bye-law provision
Erne and Lower Bann	Day boat use	While registration of craft covers frequent users of either waterway provision should be made for a user who may visit a waterways on a once or very infrequent basis
Erne and Lower Bann	Angling boats horsepower	The original registration limit on the Erne was 10hp. With the introduction of smaller more powerful 4 stroke engines many anglers see the need for this threshold to be raised to < 15hp.
Erne and Lower Bann	Insurance	In the case of high powered craft, consideration should be given to compulsory Third Party Public Liability insurance when vessels are being registered, it is standard at marina's
Lower Bann	Speed	As an enclosed narrow waterway the effects of speed are exacerbated. More attention needs to be paid to speed limits over larger sections of the river not just at locks.
Lower Bann	Zoning	As a linear waterway some high speed craft use the river as a racetrack ignoring the needs of other users who may be significantly distant from the launch points of the craft. Activity zones should be established.

BL 7 Compulsory wearing of personal flotation devices for persons under 16 years onboard a craft while underway, for persons operating/controlling a personal watercraft, motor skimmer or fast power craft while underway; and for persons being towed by a pleasure craft. All persons on board a boat of less than 7 metres in length must wear a personal flotation device, while on board an open craft or while on the deck of a decked craft.	✓			The use of PFD;s is essential as a risk control measure in this hazardous environment.
BL16 Length of stay at public moorings increased from 2 days to 3 days.		✓		Prevents moorings becoming semi residential
BL 18 Waterways Ireland's powers to designate speed limits where and when required.	✓			Critical on Lower Bann, there must be significant areas where low maximum navigation speeds must be observed.
BL 19 Waterways Ireland's powers to introduce zoning where and when required, thus restricting or prohibiting craft and/or activities at locations and/or times.	✓			Critical on Lower Bann in conjunction with above. The voluntary zoning areas of the former Lower Bann Committee must be enforced.

BL 23 Houseboats will only be permitted to moor in excess of the 3 day rule at designated houseboat locations, if in possession of a berthing licence and having paid a fee.		✓		Provisions should be made for poor weather conditions and assurances that it will not be extended to small craft
BL 29 Waterways Ireland's powers to remove and store or dispose of craft, objects or substances in the navigation.		✓		Necessary to maintain function of waterway.

BL 8, Waterways Ireland needs to be aware that in Northern Ireland under the “Railways and Transport Safety Act 2003” it is an offence to steer/control a ship or craft under the influence of alcohol or drugs. Therefore the provisions of BL8 are superfluous.

BL 31, In Northern Ireland the issue of ownership of rights is more complex that in the ROI. On the Erne and Lower Bann the fishing and access rights to fish are invariably held by other public or private bodies and anglers holding events that are shore based seek permission from the fishery owner (usually by licence) and the landowner. This byelaw needs to be clarified to indicate that it is navigational events e.g. regattas or boating events that need WI permission and not all events associated with the waterway.

Q3.3 Outline any amendments or additions that should be included in the Waterways Ireland Bye-laws (Northern Ireland) Order?

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...We can only at this stage emphasise the importance of the points we have made. The necessity to include compulsory insurance for registered craft over 15hp is needed to protect other water users (BL6).

...It is paramount that BL18 and 19 be closely implemented to ensure that there are significant zones especially on the narrow confined areas of the Erne and especially the Lower Bann where the maximum speed of water craft is restricted to a reasonable navigation speed.

Finally regulations and byelaws are enforced on the Erne system by full time water based wardens. It is **essential** that a similar system be implemented on the Lower Bann. Without enforcement all the provisions of these Bye-laws they will be completely ignored and the work wasted. Experience has shown, especially on the Lower Bann that the voluntary schemes of the former Lower Bann Committee were ignored and brought down by the activities of the unruly. Enforcement of laws and regulations is critical for effective management of these navigations.
